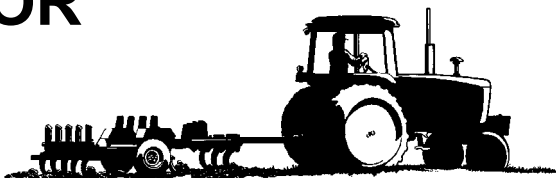

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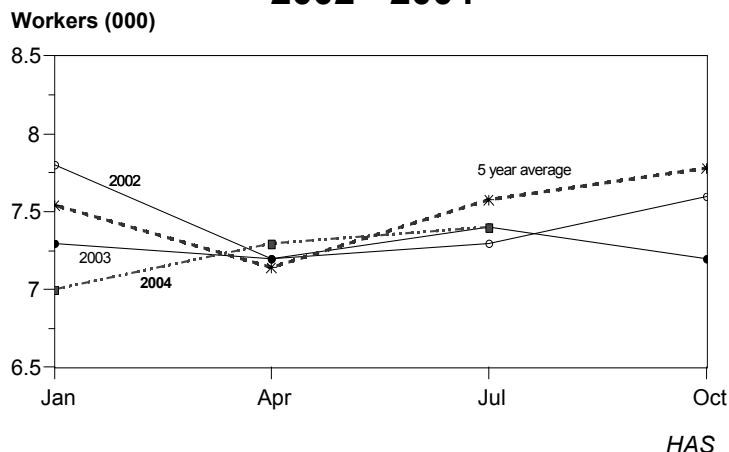

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## AGRICULTURAL HIRED WORK FORCE UNCHANGED

Hawaii's agricultural hired work force totaled **7,400** during the July 11-17, 2004, survey week. According to the *Hawaii Agricultural Statistics*, this was unchanged from July 2003, but 1 percent above April 2004. The diversified agricultural sector, with 5,350 workers, accounted for over 70 percent of the total hired work force. The sugar industry employed 750 farm workers during the survey week, while the pineapple industry employed 1,300 farm workers. Sugar and pineapple figures do not include mill and cannery workers.

The average wage paid to all hired workers during the July survey period was \$11.46 an hour, 21 cents more than July 2003. The combined average wage for field and livestock workers was \$9.90 an hour, 35 cents above a year ago.

Farms employing from 1 to 9 workers paid an average of \$11.21 per hour for all hired workers, while the combined average wage for field and livestock workers was \$9.05 an hour.

The annual average island breakdown of worker numbers will be published in the November report.

## U.S. Hired Workers Up 2 Percent, Wage Rates Up 2 Percent From a Year Ago

There were 1,293,000 hired workers on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of July 11-17, 2004, up 2 percent from a year ago. Of these hired workers, 953,000 workers were hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees on farms and ranches made up the remaining 340,000 workers.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$9.10 per hour during the July 2004 reference week, up 22 cents from a year earlier. Field workers received an average of \$8.42 per hour, up 25 cents from last July, while livestock workers earned \$8.75 per hour compared with \$8.57 a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$8.50 per hour, was up 24 cents from last year.

The number of hours worked averaged 39.3 hours for hired workers during the survey week, down 1 percent from a year ago.

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
