Week Ending April 24, 2016

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According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Mississippi, there were 2.6 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, April 24, 2016. Topsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 4 percent short, 49 percent adequate, and 47 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 3 percent short, 50 percent adequate, and 47 percent surplus. Low temperatures ranged from 50.9 degrees Fahrenheit at Hickory Flat to 63.6 degrees Fahrenheit at Vicksburg City. Highs ranged from 75.1 degrees Fahrenheit at Independence to 84.3 degrees Fahrenheit at Monticello. Most of the state received some rain with the south central part of the state receiving the most at an average of 1.01 inches.

"Corn has started to emerge, most of our wheat should be heading by the end of the week. Heavy rains are expected this week so, there will be lots of prep work done on fields for other crops."

"Producers have been out of the field for almost 2 weeks due to heavy rains. Most producers will get back in the field Monday but weather forecast is calling for more rain. Planting of all crops has been hindered."

"Producers took advantage of dry days to harvest cool season hay and baleage, resume corn and soybean planting, and applying lime and fertilizer to fields and pastures. Homeowners are busy getting vegetable gardens planted."

"Rainfall every week is still an issue for our producers. However, there has been enough time between rain events for farmers to be able to do some work in their fields."

"The local farmers are almost due with planting their corn crops. They are looking at soybeans this week with weather permitting. Our area agronomist, Charlie Stokes said that things are moving along quiet well the last week or so and should be on track this week with soybeans. Livestock fairing very well now on pasture forages."

"Rains continue to extend this planting season. Corn planted prior to the last round of rains has some emergence issues due to the saturated conditions of the soil. Looks like we will get a few days in the field this week and producers will take full advantage of it."
