Week Ending June 26, 2016

According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Mississippi, there were 6.6 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, June 26, 2016**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 17 percent very short, 41 percent short, 36 percent adequate, and 6 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 10 percent very short, 40 percent short, 43 percent adequate, and 7 percent surplus. Low temperatures ranged from 68.4 degrees Fahrenheit at Winona and Laurel to 77.8 degrees Fahrenheit at Vicksburg City. Highs ranged from 87.6 degrees Fahrenheit at Poplarville to 97.2 degrees Fahrenheit at Columbus. The state received little rain with the southeast part of the state receiving the most at an average of 0.70 inches.

Comments from Cooperative Extension Service County Agents

"Crops really need a rain. Anything not irrigated right now is struggling. Weed pressure is light due to minimal rainfall. Insect pressure is picking up in soybeans. Bean leaf beetle numbers are picking up fairly quickly. Threecornered alfalfa hoppers are nearing treatment levels as well. Starting to pick up a few juvenile worms in the soybean crop as well. In cotton, plant bug sprays are going out."

"Hot, dry, miserable heat index, typical Mississippi weather. Seeing some worm issues in spots. Nematode injury showing up more readily. Growers thought Cercospera had developed early but it was sunscald on light colored soil after the last rain."

"Row crops are growing at a steady pace with the heat and sporadic rains we have received over the last few weeks. Wheat has been harvested and late soybeans have all been planted after the wheat and have benefited from these sporadic rain showers. Pastures and hay land could use a good rain to help continue to produce forage."

"We are beginning to need some rain. Cotton and peanut crop look good. Corn would benefit from some moisture. Pastures look good, bahia has seeded out in many fields. Beef producers busy cutting and baling hay."

"It has been hot and dry since the rain we received 10 days ago. Corn and soybeans are being irrigated at this point. Insect pest numbers remain low, but SWCB trap counts increased slightly last week. Hoping to get some of the rain forecast for this week."
