



## NASS releases 2022 Census of Agriculture Watersheds Report

**St. Louis, MO – July 2024** – Today, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) released the Watersheds report, which provides data that supplements the 2022 Census of Agriculture, Volume 1. Watersheds is the first of six <u>Subject</u> <u>Series reports</u> to be released for this Census of Agriculture. The Watersheds report breaks down select ag census data – including farms, land in farms, land use and practices, fertilizer and chemical use, and select commodities – by the 6-digit Hydrologic Unit Code (watershed) boundaries, providing data users yet another way to review and compare ag census information.

The state of Missouri has land in four watersheds: The Upper Mississippi, Lower Mississippi, Missouri, and the Arkansas-White-Red watershed. Each watershed is tabulated separately and subdivided into smaller watersheds that are identified by 6-digit Hydrologic Unit codes (HUC 6).



"Most NASS publications show totals by state or county, but there is a need for agricultural statistics by watershed. This publication allows many people to see updated information for research and analysis," said NASS Heartland Regional Director Brad Summa.

"The Census of Agriculture data set is dense enough that NASS staff can retabulate it to show many important facts for watersheds, US Congressional Districts, and even zip codes," continued Summa.

"Once again, I would like to thank everyone that responded to the Census of Agriculture," said Summa. "Each individual response is confidential by law and exempt from the Freedom of Information Act, but the totals are very important to the agricultural community."

The type of data provided in the Watersheds report can be used by researchers, community organizations, policymakers and producers themselves to help assess the impact or potential impact of agriculture on the environment and surrounding bodies of water. The data can help inform decisions about government programs and grants and policies affecting producers, communities, and the agriculture industry.

According to the United States Geological Survey, the United States is divided into 20 regions (2-digit Hydrologic Unit Code level). Eighteen of the regions occupy the land area of the contiguous United States, Alaska constitutes region 19, and the Hawaiian Islands are region 20. These regions are subdivided into over 200 subregions (4-digit Hydrologic Unit Code level) based on water flow patterns from the major rivers within the region. The subregions are further divided into watersheds (6-digit Hydrologic Unit Code level). To access the Watersheds report, visit nass.usda.gov/Publications/AgCensus/2022.

Also, available through the NASS website for the 2022 ag census are the Market Value of Ag Products Rankings; State and County Profiles; Congressional District Profiles and Rankings; and the Race, Ethnicity, and Gender Profiles. In addition, the 2022 Puerto Rico Census of Agriculture data were released July 18 and can be viewed on <u>NASS's ag census web page</u>.

Upcoming ag census releases include the American Indian Reservations Report on Aug. 29; Ag Census Web Maps on Sept. 10; the Specialty Crops publication on Oct. 17; and Zip Code Tabulations on Nov. 7. Other products to be released this summer and fall include additional ag census Highlights publications found on the NASS website at <a href="http://www.nass.usda.gov/Publications/Highlights">www.nass.usda.gov/Publications/Highlights</a>. Census of Agriculture Highlights cover topics such as producer demographics, commodity specifics, and more.

Spanning more than 6 million data points about America's farms and ranches and the people who operate them, the full ag census report can be accessed at <u>nass.usda.gov/AgCensus</u>. Ag census data can also be found in NASS's searchable online database, <u>Quick Stats</u>.

In preparation for the 2027 Census of Agriculture, NASS is already asking for <u>content change</u> <u>suggestions</u> and for new producers who did not receive a 2022 Census of Agriculture questionnaire last year to <u>sign up to be counted</u> in future censuses and surveys.
