New Jersey Weather and Crop Bulletin

June 10, 2013

Cranberries were in Bloom

Days suitable for field work 5. Topsoil moisture was 5% short, 65% adequate and 30% surplus. Subsoil moisture was 80% adequate and 20% surplus. Pasture and range condition was 25% fair, 40% good, and 35% excellent. Highs reached the mid 80s and lows were in the mid 40s across the Garden State.

Grain planting continued. The winter wheat crop has matured. Cranberries were in bloom and peaches are post bloom. The strawberry harvest was nearing its end. Cool weather hurt sweet potato seed beds. Tomatoes, peppers, and potatoes were in flower. Stink bugs were reported and four-lined plant bugs are plentiful. Other activities included

planting corn and beans, side dressing corn, spraying herbicides on corn, and hay work. Livestock condition was good and milk production was average.

Climate summary for the week ending 8am 6/10/13

Temperatures averaged 64 degrees north, 66 degrees central, and 67 degrees south. Extremes were 84 degrees at Hammonton and Toms River on June 10, 2013, and 44 degrees at Belvidere on June 7, 2013.

Weekly rainfall averaged 2.95 inches north, 4.36 inches central, and 3.08 inches south. The heaviest 24 hour total reported was 3.51 inches at Trenton on June 7, 213 to June 8, 2013.

Agricultural Weather Advisory for New Jersey and Southeastern Pennsylvania Issued By Rutgers University - New Brunswick, NJ 8 am EDT Monday, June 10, 2013

Rainfall amounts one to two tenths of an inch today, quarter to half an inch with locally heavier amounts tonight, quarter of an inch with locally heavier amounts Tuesday. Winds for spraying south/southeast 5 to 10 mph through tonight, west around 10 mph Tuesday. Relative humidity in percent 60 to 70 today, near 100 tonight, 60 to 70 Tuesday. Dew points 60 to 65 through Tuesday.

Drying conditions fair at best today and Tuesday. Some dew and wetting in rainfall is likely tonight and Tuesday. Percent of sunshine near zero today and again Tuesday. There is a 70 percent probability of precipitation during the 12 hour period beginning at 8 am and ending at 8 pm that could adversely affect the performance of pesticides that require a rain-free period after application.

Temperatures in the representative cranberry bogs will remain well above freezing tonight and Tuesday night.

Hay cutting is not recommended for the next few days with slow drying and significant precipitation. Soil moisture is high and will remain high with additional rainfall today through Tuesday. The latest 8 to 14 day outlook for the period June 18, 2013 to July 2, 2013 is calling for temperatures to average near normal and precipitation to average above normal.
