**Excellent Week for Field Work:** New Jersey had an average of 4 days suitable for field work.

Some producers are still preparing the field for the spring planting. According to the New Jersey crop weather reporter, rain and cool night have slowed planting in Mercer County. Limited amount of field and sweet corn was planted. Soils conditions have improved from last week. After the long winter, finally the weather is getting better for the spring crops. Looking to the week ahead, temperatures in New Jersey range from the low 40's to the high 80's towards the end of the week.

Field activities for the week included planting asparagus, beets, cilantro, dill, endive, escarole, field corn kale, lettuce, leeks, parsley, radish, spinach, sweet corn and field corn.

# REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

ATLANTIC County, RICHARD VANVRANKEN Vegetable planting in full swing around Vineland with early greens and lettuce transplanted and seeding probably 50% completed now. Early plantings of sweet corn and peas started in Hammonton.

BURLINGTON County, NICK MOROLDA Producers are prepared fields for spring plantings.

# CUMBERLAND County, DR. WESLEY KLINE Soil conditions have improved over the last week. Temperatures are still below normal. Asparagus has started to emerge, but there has been frost damage. Transplanting continues with lettuce,

beets, leeks, Endive and Escarole being planted. Parsley, cilantro, dill, kale, spinach, radishes and white potatoes are being planted.

#### MERCER County, MEREDITH MELENDEZ

Rain and cool night temperatures have slowed planting in Mercer County. Limited amounts of field and sweet corn have been

planted. Planting continues in high tunnels and low tunnels. Field prep continues.

#### MONMOUTH County, BILL SCIARAPPA

Cold weather in January hurt grapes. Recent freezes/frosts have not hurt cherry, peach and apples very much but the blossom period was late. Tender green tissue and petals may still be susceptible this coming week or two.

#### MONMOUTH County, GABOR GRUNSTEIN

There were no abnormal changes in the weather to affect livestock, crop conditions and other activities.

#### SALEM County, AL DIBELLA

There was a freeze condition occurred on the morning of April 16th, and frost on April 17th. Farmers are laying plastic/drip in preparation to plant vegetables.
