# New Jersey

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Good Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 5 days suitable for field work. All stations reported precipitation. This cool rainy weather slowed the planting and growth of some crops, though the up and down temperatures were good for leafy greens. Temperatures across the state were somewhat above normal with lows in the 30's and highs reaching the low 80's throughout much of the state. For the second week in a row, no areas of the state are reporting any shortage in topsoil or subsoil moisture. Both are reported at adequate or surplus levels across the state.

Planting and field preparation continues. The following are being planted: beans, beets, cilantro, cabbage, collards, sweet corn, kale, leeks, lettuce, mint, parsley, peppers, radishes, Swiss chard, scallions, tomatoes (fresh and processing), summer dandelion, and field corn. Harvest continues for asparagus, broccoli rabe, cilantro, parsley, escarole, endive, kohlrabi, kale, leeks, lettuce, mint, radishes, Swiss chard, spinach (fresh and processing) and dandelions.

Harvest has also started for the first strawberries under row covers. In other areas strawberries are just setting fruit. Frost conditions continue to be of concern in cranberries with both sprinkler and flood irrigation being used to protect the crop. It is still too early to tell the impact of the weather on cranberries. Mid-June, observing the bloom, will be the earliest indication of the potential cranberry crop.
