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Good Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Some much needed moisture arrived last week, but left some areas eager for the sun to return to help crops dry down. With highs again in the 80's across the state, the season was extended for many crops as they continue to benefit from the warmer weather.

Fall harvest season continues and the following crops are still being harvested: field corn, soybeans, apples and pears, arugula, snap beans, beets, basil, cilantro, celeriac, cabbage, collards, sweet corn, dill, eggplant, escarole, fennel, endive, garlic, kale, leeks, pumpkins, lettuce, oats, parsley, peppers, radish, summer and winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach, sweet potatoes, summer dandelion, tomatoes, tomatillos, carrots, broccoli, and cauliflower. Winter wheat and cover crops are still being planted throughout the state.


